WHAT NEXT?

It is far from clear when and under what conditions churches will be able to re-open for public worship.

The Government have said that the current lockdown will end on 2nd December, but not what will follow it. To be fair, that is probably wise, as what will follow is likely to depend on how things are by then.

However, preparations proceed for our keeping of Advent and Christmas.

- New banners have been prepared for Advent reminding us of the Lord's call to renewal, and his promised blessings
- Figures are being prepared for our outside crib - which will be very prominent, directly outside the main doors of the church.
- Everyone is invited - subject to social distancing regulations in place at the time - to join in singing carols with our neighbours, from our doorsteps, on Monday 21st Dec @ 8:00 pm. Details at DoorStepCarols.com

But what about Christmas itself? Well, we simply do not know what is going to be possible, but on the presumption that we will be back in a situation to how we were before this second lockdown the plan is to have Mass offered at on Christmas Eve at 3pm, 6pm and 9pm, and on Christmas Day at 8am, 10am and 12noon.

es. Every option has its disadvantages, but the consensus is that it is best to make tickets for the Masses available through an on-line booking service such as EventBrite. This both allows people to book seats, and to easily return them if it turns out that they are unable to attend. This is important as, presuming previous social distancing arrangements are in place, the total number we can accommodate in the church for each of these Masses will be 75 people. These arrangements are not confirmed yet, because they depend on government regulation - and on the availability of Stewards and cleaners to help us to meet requirements regarding social distancing and hygiene.



It is also hoped - perhaps on 23rd December - to arrange a Mass which will be only for those who have been unable to come to Mass since the first lockdown.

These are the plans - and as soon as we **can** confirm arrangements, details will be on the parish Blog. So do sign up to that, so that you can be among the first to know what tickets are available. (And, yes, tickets will be free!!)

The parish church is presently closed for public worship. However it is open for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament on Friday evenings from 6.45pm until 8pm.

In the absence of a rota for stewards, (and so stewards need not be in the porch throughout the time of prayer) you can come into the church only from 6.45pm to 7pm, but you will be free to leave at any time you choose.

Proverbs 31:10-13,19-20,30-31

A perfect wife – who can find her?
She is far beyond the price of pearls.

1 Thessalonians 5:1-6

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons', since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it.

But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

Alleluia, alleluia! Even if you have to die, says the Lord, keep faithful, and I will give you the crown of life. *Alleluia!*

Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of Heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out.

'The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

'Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made."

'His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

'Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."
