The 'Year of Prayer'

2023-24 has been designated the Year of Prayer by Pope Francis, with a particular emphasis on the *Our Father*. It will help us prepare for the Jubilee Year "Pilgrims of Hope". It presents our Church with a significant opportunity to revisit the basics of prayer, and for us to become even more a people of prayer.

Someone once said that 'prayer doesn't help our relationship with God, prayer IS our relationship with God!' So when we become more devoted to prayer, we are building up that Divine friendship. Being Pilgrims of Hope means that we should always be growing in our love of prayer on our journey of Faith. But the Year of Prayer also asks us to consider how we might help others to pray, so that they too can experience a personal encounter with the risen Jesus.

Sunday Afternoon Advent Prayer

All are welcome to take part in times of quiet prayer on the afternoons of the first 3 Sundays of Advent.

Come to the Benedict Room at 5.30pm where we will use one of the resources being promoted by the Diocese for use in the *Year of Prayer* groups to explore the themes of Forgiveness, Healing and Mission. This brief introduction will led us into half an hour for *lectio* and personal reflection before the Blessed Sacrament in the church; followed by a coffee and chat and home-made mince-pies back in the Benedict Room. A Sacrament that finds its ultimate meaning not in our confession our sins but in our fresh experience of the power of God's love and mercy, which sets us free from sin...

Why go to Confession?

Because we **need** to be loved better...

When should we go to Confession?

The Church says Catholics *must* go to confession when we have committed sin that utterly contradicts the life we are called to: sins such as murder, adultery, and the like.

Thankfully these sins are rare, and indeed we may never commit them. But all of us will be responsible for things we are sorry about. They may be major things, or – as these things go – relatively minor, but about which we feel know shame or sorrow. We can try to ignore these things; tell ourselves they don't matter; that other people do worse things. But when we turn our heart and mind to the Lord – for example when preparing at Christmas and Easter to celebrate his saving love – we hear again the call to repent of our sins and come closer to him to benefit more fully from his love, not least through the Sacrament of Penance.

In preparing for the Sacrament we are encouraged to spend time with a passage of scripture that helps us wonder at and renew confidence in God's healing love - and his love for each one of us. And when we come to celebrate the Sacrament, it is truly celebration for it is a true meeting with him, and enjoying the gift of salvation that frees us from sin and sorts us up for our next steps on the journey of life.

The Liturgy of the Word

Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11

'Console my people, console them' says your God. 'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.'

A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low. Let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God.' Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him his trophies all go before him.

He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

Psalm 84(85):9-14(Advent)



I will hear what the Lord God has to say, a voice that speaks of peace, peace for his people.

His help is near for those who fear him and his glory will dwell in our land.

Mercy and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced. Faithfulness shall spring from the earth and justice look down from heaven. The Lord will make us prosper and our earth shall yield its fruit. Justice shall march before him and peace shall follow his steps.

2 Peter 3:8-14

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where right-eousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

And so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'





KEEPING ADVENT AT HOME

In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to



Saint Francis of Assisi who made the Christmas crèche or manger for Christmas eve of 1223.

Fasmily cribs can be put up at any time in ADvent, of course. But it is traditional to wait until after attending Christmas Mass befoe placing the figure of Jesus in the scene.

As in our parish church, many people like to populate their crib scene gradually during Advent. It can help focus us on Advent as a time of preparation, and also add a little fun to the whole thing. The last figures to be added are the wise men, arriving on January 6th, the feast of Epiphany.

The prayer of blessing offered here may be used at any time. Before saying the prayer you or another member of the family could read the story of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. Luke 2:1-8
