


What's gone wrong? What might be done about it?

Keeping us safe

The current expectation established by the Bishops' Conference (and likely to be in place until next Spring) is that those attending Mass

- will use the track and trace system, with the manual recording of contact details for those who do not use the QR code)
- wear facemasks
- and sanitise their hands on entering the church.

These three things will continue to be **required** of those attending Mass at St Nicholas.

Reasons for requiring these things are

1. They are strongly recommended by the Bishops' Conference
2. We have a relatively small church and so can offer only limited seating for those who wish to continue observing social distancing
3. Although the number of COVID cases is presently falling, the number of cases is still very high nationally and has been consistently high in our local area.
4. A significant number of our congregation are in the categories of people who are more vulnerable to COVID
5. Experts think that, at least until vaccination of teenagers is complete, and old people have had a booster jab, cases numbers will go higher.

We have offered a safe environment for people to come to Mass during this troubled time, and will continue to do so.

It may be that in coming months we will need to introduce further things to protect those coming to Mass. But for the present joining together to observe these requirements will give us all confidence that things remain safe at church for the vast proportion of those who wish to attend.

Thank you to the volunteers whose generous service, helps keep us safe (and open!)

Mass for all who have died during the Pandemic

Many of us will have been saddened during the time of the pandemic not only by the death of family or friends but because we were unable to take part in their funeral services.

Our parish Mass at 7pm on All Souls Day, offers us an opportunity to come together to remember those who have died, and offer Mass together for them. Nearer the time you will be able to submit the names of those you would like to be remembered at this Mass - just the people who have died during the time of the COVID-crisis - and their names will be read out at the Mass, which will also be offered for them. But do make a note of the day and time for this Mass. Thank you to Vincent Byrne who will be playing the organ at the Mass to enrich our worship.

There will also be the usual opportunity to ask for November Masses for the deceased, and also, simply, to place names before the altar of those you would like to be remembered at all our November Masses.

The Collect

The Liturgy of the Word: The word of God invites us into the unending dialogue between God and his people, a dialogue sealed as we share the Eucharistic food and drink. A brief silence after the readings helps us take the word of God to heart and begin a prayerful response to what we have heard.

Wisdom 2:12,17-20

The godless say to themselves: 'Let us lie in wait for the virtuous man, since he annoys us and opposes our way of life, reproaches us for our breaches of the law and accuses us of playing false to our upbringing. Let us see if what he says is true, let us observe what kind of end he himself will have. If the virtuous man is God's son, God will take his part and rescue him from the clutches of his enemies. Let us test him with cruelty and with torture, and thus explore this gentleness of his and put his endurance to the proof. Let us condemn him to a shameful death since he will be looked after – we have his word for it.'

Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it. Peacemakers, when they work for peace, sow the seeds which will bear fruit in holiness.

Where do these wars and battles between yourselves first start? Isn't it precisely in the desires fighting inside your own selves? You want something and you haven't got it; so you are prepared to kill. You have an ambition that you cannot satisfy; so you fight to get your way by force. Why you don't have what you want is because you don't pray for it; when you do pray and don't get it, it is because you have not prayed properly, you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the light of the world, says the Lord; anyone who follows me will have the light of life. Alleluia!

Mark 9:30-37

Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

The Prayer of the Faithful
