Gathering in Christ and as Christ

Over these past weeks we have been invited to reflect more on the expectation that as we gather to celebrate Mass, in all of our diversity, we seek and work to become one. We are invited to find unity in our common work of gathering, greeting and being greeted, singing and praying - we are called to assemble as members of the Body of Christ, helping each other to receive him and respond to him, to find the fullness of life again in him. We are called to work to this end, serving the good of our community, not only looking for our own benefit from being 'at Mass'.

Over the past days we may have seen how often in debates and interviews related to the present horrors in the Middle East and taking place on TV and the radio, podcasts and even in our own homes, work places and social gatherings, many people are keen to speak up and look to their own interests but are blind, and deaf to, careless of the needs and circumstances of others.

It is a weakness that is endemic in our society - and maybe it is a fault that in our tradition can be traced back to goings-on in the Garden of Eden!

The Synodal Process put in place by Pope Francis, and that has just come to the end of the present stage with the end of this months meeting in Rome, seeks to challenge just this what for short-hand we might call self-ishness. At the end of the meeting the men and women of that Assembly wrote to us and the whole Church:

As the proceedings of the first session of the 16th Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops draw to a close, we want to thank God with all of you for the beautiful and enriching experience we have lived. We lived this blessed time in profound communion with all of you. We were supported by your prayers, bearing with you your expectations, your questions, as well as your fears. As Pope Francis requested two years ago, a long process of listening and discernment was initiated, open to all the People of God, no one being excluded, to "journey together" under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, missionary disciples engaged in the following of Jesus Christ.

The session in which we have been gathered in Rome since 30 September is an important phase of this process. In many ways it has been an unprecedented experience. For the first time, at Pope Francis' invitation, men and women have been invited, in virtue of their baptism, to sit at the same table to take part, not only in the discussions, but also in the voting process of this Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. Together, in the complementarity of our vocations, our charisms and our ministries, we have listened intensely to the Word of God and the experience of others. Using the conversation in the Spirit

method, we have humbly shared the wealth and poverty of our communities from every continent, seeking to discern what the Holy Spirit wants to say to the Church today. We have thus also experienced the importance of fostering mutual exchanges between the Latin tradition and the traditions of Eastern Christianity. The participation of fraternal delegates from other Churches and Ecclesial Communities deeply enriched our discussions.

Our assembly took place in the context of a world in crisis, whose wounds and scandalous inequalities resonated painfully in our hearts, infusing our continued on page 3


The Liturgy of the Word Exodus 22:20-26

continued from page 4. work with a particular gravity, especially since some of us come

from countries where war rages. We prayed for the victims of deadly violence, without forgetting all those who have been forced by misery and corruption to take the dangerous road of migration. We assured our solidarity and commitment alongside the women and men all over the world who are working to build justice and peace.

At the invitation of the Holy Father, we made significant room for silence to foster mutual listening and a desire for communion in the Spirit among us. During the opening ecumenical vigil, we experienced how the thirst for unity increases in the silent contemplation of the crucified Christ. In fact, the cross is the only cathedra of the One who, having given himself for the salvation of the world, entrusted His disciples to His Father, so that "they may all be one" (John 17:21). Firmly united in the hope brought by His Resurrection, we entrusted to Him our common home where the cries of the earth and the poor are becoming increasingly urgent: "Laudate Deum!" ("Praise God!"), as Pope Francis reminded us at the beginning of our work.

Day by day, we felt the pressing call to pastoral and missionary conversion. For the Church's vocation is to proclaim the Gospel not by focusing on itself, but by placing itself at the service of the infinite love with which God loved the world (cf. John 3:16). When homeless people near St. Peter's Square were asked about their expectations regarding the Church on the occasion of this synod, they replied: "Love!". This love must always remain the ardent heart of the Church, a Trinitarian and Eucharistic love, as the Pope recalled on October 15, midway through our assembly, invoking the message of Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus. It is "trust" that gives us the audacity and inner freedom that we experienced, not hesitating to freely and humbly express our convergences, differences, desires and questions.

Between now and the Synod's concluding meeting in October its members have the challenge not to just speak fine words and enjoy the experience of their meeting, but to live that work of listening and caring in their 'regular' lives.

Being Church is no easy matter. It is something we are called to in our every Mass; and the spiritual exercise that is every Mass, so that might draw maximum benefit from it for our own lives, yes, but also to support our faithful response to the call for us to be as Christ for others.
