Lectio Divina

The very title might put some people off! But that would be a real pity.

The Latin words mean *Divine Reading* and the phrase is sometimes translated as *Sacred Reading*. Those titles might be more accessible but these too may seem a little forbidding!

I like to think of *Lectio* as the spiritual equivalent of a long leisurely hot bath. Sound more appealing?

These days we less often have baths and more often take showers. They are quick and convenient.

We can read scripture in that sort of a way too - reading it for information, for interest.

But *Lectio* invites us to something more, and to something much richer and much more valuable.

Lectio invites us to a comfortable and relaxing soak in God's word. Spending quiet time pondering the words of Scripture, slowly draws us into the presence of the Word himself, Jesus Christ.

Give it a go. Take a passage of this week's scripture. Maybe a whole reading, maybe just a sentence or a phrase. Quietly, gently reflect on it: let the words run through your mind and heart. It may be you end focussing on just one word. No matter. Take your time, relax, chill out and listen for the Lord speaking to you in what you keep hold of... *Fr Allen*



Confirmation

The next confirmation programme – **FOR CHILDREN NOW IN YEAR 5** – begins after half term. There is an introductory meeting for parents immediately after the parish 7pm Ash Wednesday Mass. The enrolment forms will be available then or the Sunday before from the parish church. Candidates for the Sacrament will be formally enrolled at each of the parish's Sunday Masses on 9/10 March. The Archdiocese will notify the parish of the date for the Confirmation Mass after the summer.



The BoD has retained the Catholic Practice criteria restated below*. For Admissions to Bishop Walsh it has decided to give first priority, after looked-after children, to those children from the four feeder parishes, **who are from practicing Catholic families** and **who have not attended the designated feeder schools**. These were subject to consultation recently.

For full details of admission criteria for any school please consult their website.

* *Certificate of Catholic Practice* means a certificate issued by the family's parish priest (or the priest in charge of the church where the family attends Mass) in the form laid down by the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales.

It will be issued if the priest is satisfied that at least one Catholic parent or carer (along with the child if he or she is over seven years old) have (except when it was impossible to do so) attended Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation for at least five years (or, in the case of a child since the age of seven, if shorter).

The Certificate of Catholic Practice can only be obtained from a Catholic Priest and must be attached to a SIF form when making an application. It will also be issued when the practice has been continuous since being received into the Church if that occurred less than five years ago. It is expected that most Certificates will be issued on the basis of attendance. A Certificate may also be issued by a priest when attendance is interrupted by exceptional circumstances which excuse from the obligation to attend on that occasion or occasions. Pray with Pope Francis


The Pope's prayer intention for March is that Christian communities, especially those who are persecuted, feel that they are close to Christ and have their rights respected.
